

DOG FOULING

Please see below from the District Council:

Dear residents,

The parish council has reported to us that there is a growing dog fouling issue across our districts. Although there are many benefits that come with owning a dog (especially during lockdown), there are also responsibilities which include cleaning up after your dog. Please be aware that it is an offence to not clean up after your dog or leave used dog waste bags anywhere other than an appropriate bin. Under the Dog Fouling of Land Act 1996, allowing your dog to foul can result in an onthe-spot fixed penalty notice of £50 and incorrect disposal of dog waste bags e.g. not putting them in the bin can result in an £80 fixed penalty notice. If fines are not paid, cases can be escalated to court resulting in fines of up to £1,000. There are some council owned litter bins within your parish. These can be used for both litter and dog waste bags – you do not need to find a specialist dog waste bin. You can also put dog waste bags in your black general waste wheelie bin so if you cannot find a bin or bins are full, please take it home. We know that most residents take a lot of pride in their local area and we encourage everybody to take extra steps in keeping your parish clean and tidy. PUBLIC ART

The Vale of White Horse District Council has allocated funds to East Challow Parish Council for a Public Art project. The Parish Council is considering the idea of a "Suffolk Style Village Sign" as a central feature for the Village and two smaller features for the entrance verges, it is intended that these contain the Village name. A brief has been put together and local designers/artists are being invited to submit their ideas for the project. It is also proposed to prepare a time capsule which would be placed under the foundation of the central feature.



Tell us what you think of County's Household Waste and Recycling Centres

Read the story on the Oxfordshire County Council's <u>website</u> or below:

People who live or work in Oxfordshire are urged to have their say on the county's household waste and recycling centres (HWRCs).

Oxfordshire County Council has started a consultation process to find out the views of residents, businesses and other organisations on the service that is provided now and what they might like to see in the future.

People can have their say by visiting <u>Let's Talk Oxfordshire</u>, the council's new digital consultation and engagement platform.

The council currently provides seven HWRCs for residents to bring household waste for disposal and recycling. The service accounts for 15 per cent of the county's total household waste.

However, some of the sites are already nearing capacity and, as the county's population grows, the council wants to ensure that its HWRCs remain affordable and help residents manage their waste in the most environmentally friendly way. The council wants to know people's views on Oxfordshire's HWRCs, how people currently use the service and their opinions on ideas for the future.

Councillor Dr Pete Sudbury, Oxfordshire County Council's Cabinet Member for Climate and Environment, said: "We want as many people as possible to get in touch with us to tell us what we're doing well and what we could do better when it comes to our HWRCs. The feedback we get will be invaluable in helping us move the service forward to meet the future needs of the county.

"Even if you don't use our HWRCs at the moment, we would still love you to get involved and tell us if there is anything we could do to encourage you to use them in the future."

The consultation is aimed at finding out what people value about the service and how they use it so that the council can ensure that it prioritises that going forward.

Views are sought on issues including the distance people travel to the HWRCs, what materials they take to dispose of, opening hours, permits, booking systems and vehicle restrictions. Comments and suggestions are also welcome.

The council's seven HWRCs are based in:

- Alkerton, near Banbury
- Ardley, near Bicester
- Dix Pit, near Witney
- Drayton, near Abingdon
- Oakley Wood, near Wallingford
- Redbridge, in Oxford
- Stanford-in-the-Vale, near Faringdon

Garden waste collection

Many of us have had problems with garden waste collection (Brown bins) in the last few weeks and it is likely to continue, so a brief summary might help.

Biffa is operating with approximately 20% fewer staff than is needed. Driver shortages is a national issue also affecting supermarkets. The increased demand for drivers means that many are tempted by more lucrative and attractive jobs than collecting rubbish. Brexit also reduced the driver pool. The issue came to a head more than a month ago when seven rounds were unable to go out which led to significant disruption. Biffa have been doing their best to try and manage the situation by a recruitment drive, staff incentives, earlier collections, weekend working and diverting supervisors. If the Vale didn't divert the garden waste resources to collect food waste, residual waste and recycling then Biffa would not be able to collect these, but they'd also struggle to catch up, which would have knock on effects.

The main queries the Vale have had are around not delivering on commitments; rebates/refunds/compensation; cancellations; lack of notice/bins already full; no direct communication with customers/Covid & Brexit not applicable. New customers have also been affected– some have had a bin but no collections.

Customers are being contacted. To prevent this situation escalating the Vale suggest pausing new subscriptions until further notice

Billing takes place every week, so customers will continue to get an invoice/DD collected until further notice. This will undoubtedly generate some further complaints. Pausing billing/collecting DDs for all customers, is relatively straightforward with cash-flow being the main (negligible) impact but there would be knock- on effects that would need working through. There is currently no contractual need to take this action as the Vale is still aiming to meet their 20 contractual obligations, but this is being kept under review with the option of giving additional collections or a free period being most likely.

It is worth remembering that the Stanford-in-the-Vale recycling centre takes green waste at no charge.

However, we are pressing the Vale to reconsider the issue of rebates and to explore restarting collection sooner than they had planned.

The most common questions and comments are similar to those received by the contact centre:

Comment: Requests/demands for refunds.

Response: The Vale is contacting customers individually.

Question: Why weren't customers given any notice.

Response: It wasn't always possible to give notice since on the problem Monday morning the business continuity plan was activated because there were insufficient drivers available to provide the waste service as a whole. This meant, suspending the garden waste service to prioritise everyone's food waste, recycling and rubbish collections.

A county-wide consultation on air quality is under way – please see (<u>www.consultation.oxford.gov.uk/policy-and-communications/new-air-quality-website/</u>). The deadline to submit your comments is 5 September.

The County Council is asking us to give them our thoughts on the Oxfordshire Plan 2050, particularly in relation to: how we work/transport, proposed levels of growth and how this might affect the rural landscape, housing/affordable homes, renewable energy/the move to zero carbon, communication and the source of our food. The consultation is now open for 10 weeks until Friday 8th October. See www.oxfordshireopenthought.org/oxfordshire-plan.







The scammers will come after you

Do you have a new phone and new number? Be prepared: it is likely that scammers will still be texting you within just two weeks.

A Which? survey has found that of new numbers that have not been shared with anyone, still half of them receive at least one scam text message within the first two weeks.

Scammers do it by using computers to generate numbers. They then send messages out in bulk, using 'Sim farms' – devices that operate several cards at a time.

The most frequently received scam message for all of us in recent months has been a text message claiming to be from Royal Mail, usually requesting small amounts of money for a parcel to be delivered. 70 per cent of us have received that fake delivery text over the past five months.

Fewer wasps

Noticed how peaceful your garden is this summer? Noticed that you have been able to hold summer barbecues and picnics in relative peace? That is because the very cold and wet Spring was disastrous for our wasp population.

But while we may enjoy their absence, scientists at University College London have pointed out that wasps play an important role as nature's pest controllers, and that our countryside will be the poorer without them this year.

A hidden danger of junk food

Now here is something you may not have considered: if your diet includes high levels of junk food and unhealthy snacks, you could be more likely to have a car crash.

It is thought that junk food diets and unhealthy snacking contribute to high levels of fatigue, which in turn lead to dangerous driving habits.

The study was published in the journal Occupational & Environmental Medicine. The study also found that drivers who consume high levels of vegetables and staple foods are less likely to become tired while driving.

Children and tea-drinking

Put the kettle on. Children should begin to drink tea from the age of four, in order to combat later stress, obesity and heart disease.

So says the results of a recent study which appeared in the Nutrition and Food Technology journal. It says that green tea and the more traditional black tea contain compounds which can aid concentration and cognitive function.

As one doctor said, "Including three cups of black tea daily as a part of a healthy lifestyle could help to preserve physical and mental health in childhood... and into old age."

Parents could offer tea as a substitute for sweet and sugary drinks for children.
