

- it is a single carriageway in each direction, with 3 dualled sections at Kingston Bagpuize, A338 junction and Cumnor
- ¥ all connecting roads join the A420 at T junctions, with no slip roads or linking carriageways
- ¥ passenger buses run on the A420 with bus stops in the carriageway
- ¥ it runs through villages requiring residents to cross constant streams of very heavy traffic with very limited protection - County Council provided 2 pedestrian islands near Fyfield last year at my insistence after (yet another) pedestrian fatality, but there is no protection at the Coxwells, at Faringdon, at Longcot or at Watchfield
- the resulting road accidents make it the 'road from hell' stated David Johnston MP in ¥ a submission to the roads Minister in 2020
- Swindon Borough Council acknowledge its limited capacity in calling for it to be ¥ dualled

### **OCC's CURENT TRANSPORT STRATEGY**

Oxfordshire County Council (OCC's) Local Transport Strategy 4 designates HGV traffic to use M4/A34 except for diversions, but this is not required or enforced. Residents complain frequently about the growth of freight traffic on A420. When accidents occur, all traffic including HGVs, is diverted through our villages which are not suitable for HGV traffic, especially articulated carriers which should be required to use M4/A34.

### **OPPORTUNITIES FOR CHANGE?**

IN 2021 OCC is drawing up its next Local Transport and Connectivity Strategy with a public consultation on the 'visions' due to by the end of 2021. This will be the opportunity to make clear the limits of the current A420. We should press for definite restriction of HGV traffic, except for local deliveries, requiring through traffic to use M4/A34 to reduce the dangers of the current use of this road. (This consultation will not be area specific, but will be first opportunity to state the limits of the A420 in its current state.) The final transport strategy will have to be supported by Swindon.

IN 2022 England's Economic Heartland (EEH) is planning a road corridor study in 2022 of A34/ A430 as one corridor to assess the impact of traffic through this area and how best to meet the ambitions for future development by Swindon and Oxfordshire. It will be important to have established the limits of A420 for that study.

### **COMMENTS (personal) ON FUTURE PLANS**

After close attention to A420 for past 5 years, and representing OCC at the EEH regional meetings in that time, it's clear that the solutions lie in solving the congestion of the A34, which is the sole link road from Southampton to the Midlands

At Hinskey Hill A34 joins Oxford City's local ring road, then picks up A420 traffic at Botley, A40 and A44 traffic at Peartree, before connecting with M40 at junction 9. It becomes a nearpermanent traffic jam. OCC has long identified the need to separate OxCity's local traffic from A34 strategic traffic, and until that is resolved there is no solution to A420. Highways England is working (slowly) on plans to improve the congestion, but no proposals are likely for some time.

Swindon Borough Council's proposal to dual A420 would not solve any problem at all: it would simply carry more Swindon/Oxford traffic faster from Swindon to the A34 traffic jam at Botley roundabout. It seems unlikely to convince any transport planner.

# Oxfordshire County Council - Yvonne Constance County Councillor for Shrivenham Division

There were 2 major road-closing accidents on A420 in the last 10 days of October which remind us that this road is not fit for purpose. The recent public announcement by Swindon Borough Council about their ambition to dual the road only emphasises the fact that this road is carrying more traffic than its capacity, and it does not meet the ambitions of Swindon to develop as a freight distribution centre to serve their ambitions in the Oxford/Cambridge Arc.

Swindon's ambitions acknowledge that A420 is not currently suitable for the traffic it carries, and would certainly not meet its growing plans to become a still greater distribution centre and location for major new housing developments as part of the Arc.

In Oxfordshire we are aware that Swindon has built 1 million sq ft distribution space at Symmetry Park (opposite the Swindon police station on A420) which is to be occupied by Amazon in near future and Go Outdoors has announced plans to move into the Park as well. The traffic impacts on the A420 are not yet understood, but it is clear that A420 through Oxfordshire will be expected to carry still more Swindon traffic. Redevelopment of the Honda site (675k sq ft) is also being planned, and Swindon has started an Environmental Impact Assessment of the suitability of the site, currently indicating that all traffic will be required to use the A419 to M4/A34. OCC officers are watching this EIA with close interest and I am urging OCC to ensure close contact with Swindon.



# Speeding VAS/SID

You may have seen that the speed indicator (VAS – Vehicle Activated Speed) sign outside the Old School House has been replaced free of charge by the county council. We are negotiating with them to see if we can get a bigger, flashy SID (Speed Indicator Device – see https://www.elancity.co.uk/evolis-radar-speed-sign/) similar to the one in East Hanney and elsewhere.



# Why you should never play Fetch with sticks

Dogs and sticks do not mix, and now vets have issued a warning about the possible dangers. Following two incidents where dogs chasing sticks impaled themselves and nearly died, the British Veterinary Association (BVA) warns that getting your dog to run with a stick can be life-threatening, and as it can lodge down their throat or puncture their soft palette or

Instead, people should use blunt toys that cannot piece flesh, such as rubber sticks, balls and frisbees.

Senior vice-president of the BVA said: "Vets frequently see dog injuries caused by sticks, ranging from cuts and scrapes in the mouth to the stick becoming lodged in their throat. I have seen cases of traumatic stick injuries that have needed extensive surgery to fix.

"We would never discourage owners from exercising or playing with their dog, but our advice is to swap sticks for dog-safe toys instead, and so avoid such easily preventable and distressing injuries."

# Beware raw sewage

If you are thinking of doing any wild swimming dips over the Christmas break, bear this in mind: more than half of England's major rivers are polluted with raw or partially treated sewage.

This is partly because water companies have been allowed to release raw sewage into rivers and seas as part of a 'combined sewer overflow' – a legacy of Britain's Victorian drainage systems. It has allowed for rainwater and liquid waste to be combined in the same tanks.

This overflow into waterways has acted as an escape valve, stopping floods in homes and streets. The overflow option is meant only for an emergency, but in fact, it took place more than 400,000 times last year.

# Buy them books

Buy your children some books for Christmas. It seems that more books in your home in childhood can help stave off dementia in later life, according to a recent study.

It found that children who are exposed to the written word from a young age, form more resilience against degenerative processes which can lead to Alzheimer's.

Nurturing our brain in our early years boosts our 'cognitive reserves', as intellectually stimulating activities like reading create extra connections in the brain. That acts as a long-term buffer against cognitive decline in later life.

The study was done at the School of Public Health at the University of Haifa in

### How many trees are enough?

How many Christmas trees will you have this year? Last year many bored families, stuck at home during the festive season, decided to branch out and set up two or more Christmas trees – often one in a pot for the front of the house, and a bigger one inside.

# **Dwindling wildlife in Britain**

Be kind to the wildlife in your garden – what little of it remains. The UK is one of the world's most nature-depleted countries, and it may not even have enough biodiversity - variety of plant and animal life - to prevent an ecological meltdown.

That is the finding of new data by the Natural History Museum. It says that the UK has an average of only 53 per cent of its natural biodiversity left, well below the global average of 75 per cent.

Worldwide, scientists warn that the variety of plant and animal life of earth is dwindling fast. It will have a serious impact on human life: "those systems have lost enough to mean that we have to be careful about relying on them functioning in the way that we need them to."

### Be kind

Try to be kind to each other this Christmas: many of us could do with some gentle encouragement. Depression and anxiety have risen by more than a quarter since the pandemic, according to the first global estimate of Covid's impact on mental health last year. The reduced interaction of people, the increase in isolation, coupled by high infection rates, were the cause of more than 125 million extra cases of depression and anxiety disorders in 2020.

The findings, published in the Lancet, reported that globally, depressive disorders have increased by 28 per cent, and anxiety by 26 per cent.

# **Plastic spending**

We spent more than £4 in every £5 by using plastic last year, according to the British Retail Consortium. Debit and credit card transactions accounted for 81 per cent of all our spending, up from 78 per cent in 2019.

For the first time, we used our debit cards for more than half (54 per cent) of all our transactions. Cash accounted for 15 per cent of our total spending in retail, down from 20 per cent in 2019.
