

VICAR'S LETTER - A PAUSE FOR THOUGHT

Dear Friends

We celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty our sovereign lady Queen Elizabeth this month to express our thanks for her humble service, her constant and gracious dependability, her wise council and her dedicated commitment to honour her royal vows.



God has certainly answered our prayers that the Queen has been to "long reign over us".

Part of the celebration has been to plant trees in gratitude; - a "Treebilee" as HRH Prince Charles has reportedly called it.

You might like to know that nature has been very active this year in our Vicarage garden providing over half a dozen Horse Chestnut saplings and seeding several Sycamores.

All our English trees have a majesty and beauty of their own as well as providing a haven for hundreds of wild life - a very apt way to express our thanks.

Trees are significant in the bible; (from the second to last chapter) indeed the Christian faith is centred on the Lord who was raised to life having hung on a tree.

Psalm 1 links this beautifully to describe the Queens resilience and reliance on God - the one whose delight is in the law of the Lord is like a tree planted by streams of water which yield its fruit in season and whose leaves do not wither.

I wish you happy planting but also that you flourish like a well watered tree being refreshed and resourced by daily reading and reflecting on the truth of the bible.

Wild Watch ~ June 2022

When the primroses make their seed each one will have a sticky sweet coating. This sticky seed is attractive to ants. The ants collect the sticky primrose seeds and take them down to their nests where they are licked clean by the colony. The worker ants then take the cleaned seeds and drop them outside the nest as they forage for other food sources, which explains why the primroses are germinating along the cracks in the paths, I wonder how many other wild flowers use animals for seed dispersal?

Scientists are discovering more and more complex relationships between plants and animals, which is why growing wild native plants is such an asset to a garden as they attract all sorts of wild life.

We have field voles living in the garden, they are chocolate brown with shortish tails.

Over the last 10 years or so we have noticed an increasing number of Bussards in the sky here, last week I saw 4 riding a thermal very high up above Wantage.

Your sightings from Challow

Dear Juliet.

I keep a record of when I first see a species of bird through the year.

I saw my first chaffinch last year in January, but this year I saw my first in late April. This year I have not seen either a greenfinch or a blackcap. Both seen last year.

I have also seen fledgling blackbirds, now fully fledged. We have plenty of starlings, jackdaws and sparrows.

Just before lockdown we purchased a trail camera. It has rewarded us well. We have a hedgehog who visits regularly, occasionally we see two. Also the camera batteries have been drained by the number of times it has seen one or two wood mice. Up to 40 videos a night!! Extremely active little creatures.

Fewer bees each year, but noticed a large bumble bee guite often during the winter.

Saw 2 holly blue butterflies today May 5th. Mary Mann

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TOPICAL TALK

High Fat, Sugar, Salt (HFSS)

As part of the Childhood Obesity Strategy announced in June 2018, the government set out its intention to end the promotion of high fat, sugar or salt products.

New legislation will come into effect from 1st October 2022 which will restrict the location of certain High Fat, Sugar or Salt Foods.

Supermarkets are having to relocate these products away from their Shop entrances, Front of Store Displays, Checkouts, Aisle ends, Queueing areas etc.

Some supermarkets have already started this process which is why your shopping trip is taking a little longer because everything has had to be moved.

The 2nd part of this legislation banning the promotion of multi buy products has been postponed by the government until October 2023 because of the current cost of living crisis.

What 6000 steps a day can do for you

A recent study has found that doing 6000 steps a day can reduce your risk of an early death, if you are aged over 60. People *under* the age of 60 should aim for between 8000 and 10,000 steps a day.

However, taking more than 8000 steps a day has no particular benefit, and the oft-repeated mantra that everyone should take 10,000 step a day has no grounding whatever in science. (The 10,000 steps idea came from a 1964 Japanese marketing drive to sell pedometers!) Researchers from the University of Massachusetts Amherst point out that: "Steps are very simple to track, and there is a rapid growth of fitness-tracking devices."

The major thing to remember is that there is a "lot of evidence suggesting that moving, even a little more, is beneficial, particularly for those who are doing very little activity."

The power of earphones

You are more likely to engage with a podcast if you listen to it through your earphones, rather than a speaker. You feel closer to what you hear, and are therefore more likely to change your views and behaviour.

Those are the findings of recent research at the University of California, San Diego. As one scientist put it: "Headphones produce a phenomenon called in-head localisation, which makes the speaker sound as if they're inside your head. As a result, people perceive the communicator as warmer, feel more empathically toward them, and are more easily persuaded by them."

Pet sitters wanted!

Pet sitters are in high demand these days, as millions of people have returned to work, and must leave their cats and dogs during each day. According to the British Pet Food Manufacturers Association, one in ten households welcomed a new pet during the first seven months of lockdown. According to Adzuna, a job search website, a pet sitter can now earn an average salary of £24,000 a year for pet sitting.

Some simple tricks to save energy

The on-going rise in energy costs is eyewatering. Here are some well-proven ways to save money:

Always turn off the lights when you leave a room. Forget about maintaining an 'ambience' in your home.

Turn down your thermostat by at least a degree. Or two. Or three?

Get some LED bulbs – they are six times more efficient, last much longer, and use 90 per cent less energy than old-style bulbs.

Shower rather than bath. Don't worry about a bit of dirt on your children. It can strengthen their immune systems and help prevent them from becoming allergic to everything.

Don't boil the kettle all the time – it eats up about six per cent of all your electricity per year. Why not consider making a pot rather than a mug, so that you drink as much overall, but less often?

Make a draught excluder - you know, the ones that look like sausage dogs. Don't turn up the heat to combat a draught, fix the draught.

Keep doors closed. If you don't need to heat your WHOLE house, don't.

Put some more clothes on. We all know people who like to wear only tee-shirts at home, even in winter. If they belong to your family, get them to put on a jumper, cuddle the dog, wrap up in a blanket, or run up and down the stairs, not turn up the heating.

Set your washing machine at 30. Washing at 30 rather than 40 degrees can reduce your energy consumption by 60 per cent per cycle, according to the energy experts.

Use your electric tumble dryer less. It can account for five per cent of all household electricity. Far cheaper to buy a washing line!

Use your oven only when you can fill it up. Never cook just one thing at a time. And when you are done, leave the oven door open to help heat the house.

All of these are small steps, but together they could make a big difference this year.

When JesUs left earth at His Upward ascension, He felt there was one thing He just had to mention.


"Now go into the world and tell them it's true That the love I have shown is not just for U."

Is your house welcoming to swifts?

These boomerang-shaped little birds have recently been added to the list of endangered birds because they have a severe housing crisis: modern homes do not have nooks and crannies for them to nest in. Swifts are in serious decline: they have faced a 58 per cent drop in their numbers since 1995.

Because modern homes are less likely to have spaces between bricks and in the eaves, the RSPB is now pushing for special 'swift bricks', that contain small tunnels and nesting space, to be installed in new-build homes.



Help, my kids just asked me a science question!



Why aren't dinosaurs in the Bible?

The Bible wasn't written to list all the animals on earth or tell us about science. It was written a long time before people started to use science to learn about the world.

When the Bible was written, people didn't even have a word for dinosaurs yet! But it's not just dinosaurs that aren't mentioned in the Bible, it doesn't talk about armadillos, kangaroos, sabretoothed cats or penguins either!

That doesn't mean that the Bible is out of date or wrong, or that these animals aren't important. Rather than teaching us science, many Christians believe that the Bible was written to tell people about God, how much He loves them, and all the amazing things He has done.

The Bible says that God made everything, and loves everything He made, so that includes dinosaurs. It also encourages people to explore and find out all about the wonderful things it says God has made. Science is a part of this exploration.

Did God make the dinosaurs?

The Bible (the holy book that Christians read) says that God made everything. All the stars, the Earth and all the amazing plants and animals that have ever lived here. So yes, most Christians believe that God made the dinosaurs!

The Bible also teaches that God loves it when people explore His creation, and science is a great way of doing that. So, for many Christians, science is one of the fun things we can use to learn all about *how* God made everything, including all of the dinosaurs!

Were humans and dinosaurs ever living on earth at the same time?

Yes! But probably not the kind of dinosaur you're thinking of! Most of the dinosaurs died out a very, very long time ago, way before humans first lived. But some of the smaller, feathery dinosaurs survived and over a long time they have evolved into the animals we call birds.

So, from chickens and robins to penguins and ostriches, there are dinosaurs living all over our world today!

God in the Arts

The Thread of God's love

In 563 an Irish monk was forced to leave his homeland because of a conflict that had led to a misuse of power and even bloodshed. On Pentecost Sunday he arrived on the island of Iona off the north-west coast of Scotland with twelve companions. There he began a new way of life, founded on Christ's mercy and forgiveness of the past, and so created one of the great centres of faith and mission in the Christian Church. His name was Columba, and we keep his feast day on 9th June.

His monastery on Iona started as a small cluster of wooden buildings with a church and a guesthouse. Around were fields of crops and cattle and bees. But under Columba's guidance, it grew, and from Iona monks were sent into Scotland as one arm of a missionary advance that reached down through England to France and across Europe.

That outreach was an amazing achievement. But just as amazing was the consolidation of monastic life on Iona that resulted two centuries later in the Book of Kells. This text of the four Gospels was begun by scribes and artists in the library of Iona. It grew into one of the masterpieces of Celtic art that was taken to Kells in Ireland to escape the Viking invaders who ravaged the island.

Along with the text of the Gospels, there are illustrations of Jesus, Mary and the four evangelists, together with decorations at once intricate and fantastic: patterns that interweave and interlace across the page with an odd face here and a weird creature there. The design is in brilliant detail, and you can follow the lines as they weave in and out. This delight in patterns is evident in lots of Celtic art.

It is good to imagine Columba on Iona meditating on the thread of God's grace woven into his life as he looked back to his years in Ireland and his pilgrimage to Iona. It might have seemed

at one glance a complicated interweaving of events and experiences, and then perhaps as he looked again, he would see God's love threading its way through that history and redeeming both it and him.

It is the same for us. As we look at our lives, they may seem complex and involved patterns of events and circumstances taking us here and there. As we ponder those patterns, then we can begin to see a thread woven into the patterns that guides and leads us on. And as we stand back, all the patterns and threads seem to make sense as we spot that guiding thread. Just as we can stand back from the designs of this page and see God's love spelling out the name of Christ, our Lord.



OPEN THE BOOK

Update on housing development footpaths

We are all well aware of the delayed completion of the footpaths around the Crest Nicholson site and the incomplete old footpath through the MacTaggart and Mickel site.

Crest were required to start the footpath along the A417 by May 9th and complete by June 10th otherwise they would suffer a financial penalty. They had completed 90% of it by the end of May 9th. Why they couldn't complete it puzzles me but it must be complete for use by June 10th.

The M+M footpath has also been annoying since there has been a mess-up with SSE putting a pole in an incorrect and unsafe position. The footpath was originally planned for opening last August. The footpaths people at OCC were pulling their hair out since there was little they could do. However, complaints to the M+M HQ in Glasgow ended with a promise to open by end April which has been done. Nevertheless, a lot remains (as I write May 11) to be done with resurfacing, reworking a nasty step, weed clearance and tree cutting but the site manager has agreed that this will be done before the site is completed in a month.

Health

At a meeting of HOSC (County Health Scrutiny Committee) on May 10th two of the major issues discussed were GP access and maternity services. They are trying to improve telephony with more lines to GP practices but they had to admit that more phone lines requires more people to answer the calls! Staff shortage and retention amongst GPs and technical positions is a major issue and international recruitment is underway. This is primarily a national problem.

Staff shortage is the main reason for the continuing closure of the Wantage maternity unit. We will be updated on the situation by the beginning of June.

Nature Recovery Forum

I chaired an online Forum for Nature Recovery and Biodiversity on May 10th to give parish councils some ideas of what they might do in "their own back yards". Speakers included Richard Benwell, Roselle Chapman (Wild Oxfordshire) and Jeremy Biggs (Fresh Water Habitats Trust). This was very useful and constructive and there will be a follow-up meeting June 2nd.

Countryside Records footpaths

I have listed for registration the additional footpath leading from Marsh Lane to Challow Marsh Farm. I have no idea of the time-line for approval. We hope to open up the footpaths north of the village for recreational walking and are awaiting the Wasborough Estate to clear the paths on their land.


