Dear Friends

I am looking forward to celebrating the Coronation and, though I am still getting used to praying for our sovereign lord King Charles rather than our sovereign lady queen Elizabeth, I do sincerely pray that God will endue him with wisdom and that his role may be a uniting focus for our countries of England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. In these challenging times we do need to co-operate constructively together for everyone's good.

A crown is round to be able to be placed fittingly on the head, and not only does it symbolise leadership its circular base also illustrates unity.



The same weekend our parishes will be holding a Confirmation service led by Bishop Gavin Bishop of Dorchester, laying hands on the candidates' heads and praying that their faith may be made strong as they commit to following Jesus.



If buttercups were in bloom, by the time we crossed the fields our white ankle socks would be covered in yellow pollen.

COUNTDOWN TO THE CORONATION Of His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen

On Saturday 6th May the Coronation will take place

It is based on a solemn religious ceremony which has remained largely unchanged for more than 1000 years. For the past 900 years, the ceremony has taken place at Westminster Abbey, and is conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

King Charles III will be crowned, and then in a similar, but simpler ceremony at the same service Queen Camilla will also be crowned.

From 6th to 8th May Coronation Big Lunches will be held up and down the UK, and also across the Commonwealth.

On Sunday 7th **May a Coronation Concert** will be held at Windsor Castle, with iconic locations across the UK lit up using projections, lasers, drone displays and illuminations.

On Monday 8th **May** there is a special Bank Holiday, giving everyone the opportunity to join in with their communities and good causes through Big Help Out activities.

The Pothole Crisis

If you drive, you already know this: the potholes are getting worse.

Some experts have warned that one in five of our roads will be undriveable in the next five years, unless we get to grips with the crisis.

In its recent annual survey on the state of the country's roads, the Asphalt Industry Alliance (AIA) has found that about 37,000 miles of road, or 18 per cent, are in very poor condition. Without intervention, these roads have less than five years of 'life' left in them.

But intervention costs billions of pounds. This latest 'Alarm' report estimates that now more than £14 billion is needed to fix all of England and Wales' potholes, and generally get the country's roads back up to standard.

Looking further ahead, the AIA predicts that while just over half of all local roads are in good structural condition, the remaining 100,000 miles of roads may need to be rebuilt in the next 15 years, unless adequate maintenance is speedily introduced.

It is not as if the government is ignoring the problem. Jeremy Hunt has provided an additional £200 million one-off payment to fix potholes on our roads. That is in addition to the Government's annual £500 million pothole fund. This means that in 2023/4, the Government is going to pour an eyewatering £700 million into holes in our roads.

Meanwhile, research by the RAC Foundation has found that one in 24 road bridges across the country are substandard, and therefore unable to carry heavy vehicles.

Steve Gooding, director of the RAC Foundation, said: "Whether it is potholes or bridges, there is only so long that councils can continue to patch things up before bigger cracks literally start to appear in the road network."

Worshipping online looks set to carry on

We still enjoy 'going to church' online. In fact, recent viewing figures for the CofE's national online services reveal that they continue to receive about 150,000 views a week. Overall, in 2022, they attracted more than eight million views.

It was in March this year that the C of E marked three years since the start of the online services, which were begun during the Covid lockdown. By the end of that first year, it was found that clips and content from the services across the country had been seen 40 million times on social-media channels.

The current figure of 150,000 a week is thought to be conservative. As a Church House spokesman in London said: "Our analysis in May 2022 showed that 20 per cent of viewers watched with at least one other person, so this would have meant at least another 30,000 views." The C of E online service on New Year's Day gained 800,000 views alone.

And weekly production of services continues. Services are broadcast on social-media channels every Sunday, via YouTube and Instagram. They cover all the C of E traditions, and include estates churches, military chaplaincies, rural parishes, multiple church benefices, big county town churches, and cathedrals.

As one vicar said, "Worship online has made such an enormous difference... now we live-stream absolutely everything, and I'm really passionate about that."

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How an argument over TEA led to the founding of America

Some 250 years ago, on 10th May 1773, Britain passed the Tea Act, which favoured the British East India Company over the American colonies. This led to the Boston Tea Party in December, which escalated into the American Revolution and the establishment of the USA.

The idea of the Tea Act was to help the struggling British East India Company to dispose of its vast holdings of tea profitably in the American colonies, where much of the (inferior) tea came from Dutch sources and was smuggled in. But the colonists reacted strongly against the attempt to manipulate their tea-buying, and against British taxes generally, which they regarded as taxation without representation.

Later the same year this led to what has become known as the Boston Tea Party, where a large group of citizens, calling themselves the Sons of Liberty and dressed as Mohawk Indians, boarded the British tea ships and threw 92,000 pounds of tea into the harbour.

This was not a violent insurrection. No-one was injured, and it was reported that the Sons of Liberty swept the decks of the ships afterwards. But British politicians of all sides were appalled, not least because many of them had substantial holdings in the British East India Company.

Added to the ill-feeling resulting from the Boston Massacre in 1770, in which five people died after British troops had been taunted (the comparison with Ulster is obvious), this led in two short years to the American War of Independence, which changed everything.

Beware of your Dog's Tracker app

A number of apps which offer to keep an eye on your pet are also recording the login details and locations of YOU.

Such is the finding of a recent study. It seems that many tech companies which offer smart collars, GPS trackers, and wearable cameras for pets, may also be creating cyber security risks for their owners.

A recent study at Newcastle University and Royal Holloway, University of London, evaluated 40 such apps. It discovered that a good number of them were recording the login details and location of the owners without encryption. In addition, all but four of the apps included some sort of tracking software, which was gathering information on the owner, without their consent.

As one doctoral student at Newcastle University's school of computing explained, "Pet tech brings with it new security, privacy and safety risks to the pet owners.

"We would urge anyone using these apps to take the time to ensure they are using a unique password, check the settings and ensure that they consider how much data they are sharing or willing to share."

Bob Dylan's Blowin' in the Wind

Sixty years ago, on 27th May 1963, the folk/blues album *The Freewheelin' Bob Dylan* was released. It included the hit song *Blowin' in the Wind* and marked the start of an amazing singing-songwriting career.

It was in fact Bob Dylan's second album, but the first to contain all his own songs. He came to prominence in the protest movement of the 60s, latching on to the prevailing atmosphere with a catalogue of songs that were not only perceptive but revealed an entirely different kind of talent, from the manner of his delivery to the poetic invention of his lyrics.

Dylan's birth name was Robert Allen Zimmerman, and he was born in Minnesota, descended from Jewish immigrants from the area of Ukraine and Lithuania. He started using guitar and harmonica in folk fashion, but he soon 'went electric', to the consternation of the purists but to the delight of everyone who enjoyed his originality, range and sense of humour.

His career stalled for a short while when he was involved in a motorcycle accident in the mid-60s, but he came back strongly and unexpectedly with the wonderful country-tinged album, *John Wesley Harding*. In the late 1970s he became a Christian and issued several overtly Christian albums, starting with *Slow Train Coming*, but he eventually reverted to a more open style, though he never renounced his faith: it seems evident in his recordings up to the present day.

Although now in his 80s, he has never stopped performing or writing, usually to the highest standards. His more recent albums, such as *Time out of Mind* and *Rough and Rowdy Ways* (his 39th studio album, issued in 2020), show just as much invention and creativity as ever.



One in five people find common noises "intolerable"

Do some common noises really bother you? If you hate everyday sounds like chewing, sniffing and even moderate breathing, then you may be among the one in every five people in Britain who suffer from misophonia.

In the first study of its kind, researchers from King's College London and University of Oxford have discovered that 18.4 per cent of the general UK population say certain noises can leave them feeling 'trapped' and 'upset'.

Misophonia is a psychological condition in which common sounds made in normal life trigger more than the occasional irritation. Instead, they can trigger a fight or flight response, sparking real anger and even panic.

Clinical psychologists say that while most people dislike the sound of loud chewing, slurping, snoring and loud breathing, people with misophonia frequently react badly to even normal breathing, footsteps and swallowing.

Editor: David Pickup, a solicitor, considers the after-effects of theft

Falling among thieves

And Jesus answering said, A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves... Luke 10:30

Some of the saddest victims of crime include cases where people have been betrayed or taken advantage of by one of their own family members.

One victim lost thousands of pounds to someone with whom they shared a home. They had given their partner access to their bank and credit cards because they trusted them implicitly. Sadly, that person then accessed their accounts, spent the money, and even ran up thousands of pounds of debt. In the end, the police stepped in, and it became a criminal court case.

Is it worse being robbed by a stranger, or by someone whom you have loved? If robbed by someone you loved and trusted, it would be difficult to trust anyone ever again. And the sad reality is that your former 'friend' will probably have already spent all the money, and so there is little point trying to claim it back through the civil courts.

In cases where such betrayal ends up as a criminal court case, the police can put a victim in touch with victim support services, who will explain the court procedure to them (who is who, where to sit and what to call the judge or magistrate). If you win your case, the court can order a convicted criminal to pay compensation to the victim, and sometimes even make restraining orders.

Who can you trust? Inviting a new partner into your home and life is a big step, especially if you already share your home with others. Proverbs encourages us to take care in our relationships, especially whenever money is involved. If your partner or family member wants access to your finances, perhaps you don't need to agree right away.

Instead, take time to consider: why do they need such access? Money is power, and power is control. Why should they exercise this control over your resources? Why not tell them that you will go into your own account, and share with them any money that you have both already agreed upon?

The 'certain man' Jesus was talking about fell among thieves, but then the Samaritan cared for him. Sometimes we need to be good Samaritans to those in trouble.

The 1st May was once celebrated as a fire festival by the ancient celts known as Beltane. Today we still enjoy maypole dancing in certain places in the country and enjoy the anticipation of the arrival of summer soon to be with the May bank holiday.

Christianity reached the west side of the British Isles through missionaries who had come first from Egypt then along the northern coast of Africa and finally up through the Gaelic speaking lands of the West, Cornwall, Wales, the Isle of Man, Ireland and the Scottish Isles. It ended when the Vikings took Christianity on to Scandinavia.

The Christian missionaries would have told stories when the day's work was done. And there seem to have been hundreds if not thousands of Celtic saints but there were comparatively few different stories. It feels as though a story would be told and at the end of the telling there was a time for questions, and some bright spark would ask what was the name of the saint. And the poor narrator who was having a senior moment and although the name was on the tip of his tongue, neither he nor the rest of the group could remember it. And so they gave another name, which would explain why there are more saints than stories.

We used to go to St Maughold's church. And his story was that he came to Christ because of the preaching of St Patrick himself. He made all the right noises but Patrick did not believe him and gave him a test. He handcuffed him, threw the keys into the sea and then put him into a fishing Coracle which was then set adrift in the sea at Dun Laogherie, which is just south of Dublin and used to be the port of Dublin. The coracle floated away, for there was no oar, north and round the Isle of Man, where it beached on what is now called Maughold Head. And there waiting were three men, they had a fish that had just been caught and there inside it was the key for Maughold's handcuffs.

It seems a totally unbelievable story, although the same sort of story was told of other Celtic saints. And then at the end of the war, a German bomber, after a bombing raid on Liverpool, had a bomb stuck in his plane, he knew he could not get back to Germany so headed to Ireland, which was neutral. Just off Dun Laogherie he had to parachute from his plane. This was observed from the shore and rescue boats were launched. But nothing was found. Since he had had a little emergency boat with him and those on the shore had thought that they had seen him getting into it, a humanitarian warning was sent out to all shipping in the Irish Sea.

The Manx did not launch any lifeboats but five days later there was a little welcoming party on Maughold beach when the pilot arrived.



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It's getting harder to see your GP

When did you last see your GP, and for how long did that appointment last?

According to a recent international study of 10 high-income countries, British patients are given the shortest GP appointments and are also the least likely to see a doctor in person.

The Health Foundation found that Britain has the shortest appointment times, at ten minutes, along with Germany. Most countries average 15 minutes per patient, with 20 minutes in Switzerland and the USA, and 25 minutes in Sweden.

The British GPs also reported far more use of remote appointments than any of the other countries in the study. Just four in 10 took place in person between February and September 2022.

British GPs were also found to have the highest stress levels and lowest job satisfaction of all the GPs in the study. Professor Kamila Hawthorne, chairman of the Royal College of GPs, said the findings were "alarming, but not at all surprising".

She said: "College research has shown that two-thirds of GPs feel so over-stretched that they cannot guarantee safe patient care, and many cite workload and burn out as a reason they are considering leaving the profession.

"GPs and our teams want to deliver safe, appropriate and timely care for our patients, but with the intense workload and workforce pressures we are working under, this is becoming ever more difficult." Save the Date.....



EV Car Club run by County Council

An Oxfordshire wide car sharing pilot scheme has started in April for 12 months making electric vehicles (EVs) available for people to hire on an hourly or daily basis.

Oxfordshire CC, and all the Vale have partnered with car club providers (Co-Wheels, co-wheels.org.uk, in this area, to offer pay-per-use EVs on a 12 month trial basis. The scheme (www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/residents/road-and-transport/electric-vehicle-pilot/) gives people the chance to access an EV, without owning or leasing one outright. It could be more affordable for people who don't drive every day and provide some real experience of an EV.

The local EV car club vehicles are based in these locations: (i) Portway car park, Wantage, (ii) West St Helens car park and Cattle Market car park both in Abingdon, and (iii) Energy Superhub, Redbridge Park and Ride, Oxford.

Car club membership is required in order to use new vehicles, and residents living near the new EV car club locations should look out for promotional codes giving them free or discounted membership as an incentive to try the scheme for themselves. Members can then hire car club vehicles in the scheme from £5.95 per hour, including insurance, plus 12p per mile.

Dropped kerb at the Goodlake

Many will have seen that the dropped kerbs at the bottom of Letcombe Hill are now complete making road crossing at that point safer. We have had a problem with cars parked illegally on that stretch of footpath as it is an offence to park a vehicle in either a dangerous position or in such a manner as to cause an obstruction of the public highway, including a footway (Section 22 of the Road Traffic Act 1988 for reference!).

We also still have a problem speeding on Letcombe Hill which is particularly bad at that pinch point and a speed bump and speed sign (the latter as we have outside the Old School House) would be useful and these measures are now being discussed with County Council Highways.

New drainage

We have recently had a site visit from the Vale Drainage Team to discuss improvements to the drainage at the bottom of the village green where we have had extensive and frequent flooding affecting local residents and business at Cannings. This is long overdue and is projected to involve laying a new drainage pipe and trench under the green which should take away the surface water and sludge that collect there, together with a rain garden (drainage sump area but grassed over as it is now) in front of Longs Cottages. We don't have a date for the work yet but the parish council is seeking assurance from the Vale that this will be done with no disruption to business at Cannings and minimal interference with residents' activities.

Drains

The road drains in the village are again blocked in many places and I will be chasing the County Council to have them flushed out. This is a problem in many villages and arise from too infrequent clearing.

The Mission

A small group of residents are getting together as a charity to try and save The Old Mission building for the village community to avoid it being developed for housing or demolished as an entrance for an even bigger housing development. We envisage it being used for a variety of activities, such as clubs and local interest groups and also including non-denominational religious services as before. We will be applying to the Vale to have it registered as an "Asset of Community Value" (see https://www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk/vale-of-white-horse-district-council/community-support/assets-of-community-value/) as it is already listed as a non-designated heritage asset in our Neighbourhood Plan. We will be contacting residents soon with a flier asking for any information on known activities at The Mission in the last 10-15 years but if you already have any thoughts on how it might be used please let us know, either via my email address (below) or Bryan Miller (bjmiller663@gmail.com).

East Challow Warm Space.

Spring has arrived and there is now less need for a community warm space. However, its success with residents has meant that we will continue on alternate Fridays 11-1 as before as a community venue for coffee, chat and biscuits as before.

We really want to thank the Challows and Childrey Cricket Club and its manager Stefan Pilcher for their support for this venture and to the Quilters group for allowing us to share their space. It is much appreciated by the villagers.

Childrey Way

We are expecting an outcome/decision on the free school transport for the Childrey school children so that they do not have to walk from Childrey to King Alfred's along Childrey Way. This was brought to County Council cabinet at the end of April and by the time you read this a decision may hopefully have been made. Let's hope it is the right one!

Blowing Stone

The fight by residents and councillors continues to save one of our local country pubs, The Blowing Stone at Kingston Lisle, from being converted to a residential dwelling. I have called the planning application (P23/V0480/FUL) in for review by the full planning committee so that all sides can have their say. We need to save our village pubs – we lost our two and enough is enough!

If a vicar asks you for money...

If you are contacted by a clergyman asking you for money, beware! It is a scammer.

Scammers have been impersonating various clergy, including even the Archbishop of York, to ask priests and other church people to buy them Amazon vouchers and online gift cards.

The scammers use either emails or texts, and their message is along the lines: "I have a request I need you to handle discreetly." They then say: "I am currently busy in a prayer meeting, so no calls – just reply to my email." Then the message asks the intended victim to send them financial help, usually in the form of vouchers or gift cards.

The police reckon that the scammers have trawled church websites for the contact details of clergy and parish officials. At least one person is believed to have been fooled – and lost £1000 in a scam.

As diocesan spokesman said: "It seems this

is a national trend." The police are looking into it, and meanwhile, advising people that: "Clergy will never ask you to give them money, vouchers, or personal banking details directly, even to help someone in need.... it is a scam."



Candles in Church

I have a love hate relationship with candles in church. I love the warm glow they give, their light reflecting on the copper candlesticks on the altar. I can understand why people light

them to commemorate loved ones.

As they burn they are a prayer to God for that person.

The problem arises when lighted candles are moved as when servers carry them to accompany the priest or they are lit and put into the votive candle stand. But oh dear, has anyone thought about how hard it is to clean up spilt wax from very old broken surfaced tiles or from fabric and carpet. Wax does get spilt, it is inevitable. I wonder if using tea lights would solve the problem under the votive candle

How your friends may be keeping you alive

Take care of your friendships, and they will take care of you.

A recent study has found that if, in later life, you enjoy your friends on a regular and frequent basis, then the joy that they bring you may even halve your risk of death within five years.

The book of Proverbs (27:9) compares the balm of ointments and perfumes to the soothing effect of a good friend, and an analysis of the research would seem to confirm this. People in their later years who socialised every day were healthier than those who didn't. Even those who saw their friends only once a week were healthier than those who saw no friends on a regular basis.

In fact, the team reported having found a 'dose response', with the greater the frequency of socialising, the greater the likelihood of living longer. As one doctor put it: "The more frequent the social activity, the more prolonged the survival time."

It is thought that having regular contact with friends encourages healthier thinking, better personal habits, increased physical activity, and reduces stress.

Yet according to Age UK, more than two million older people in England live alone, and more than a million older people can go for a month without speaking to anyone.

The study was published in the Journal of Epidemiology & Community Health.


